BACK TO SCHOOL SAFETY

It's hard to believe, but it's almost back-to-school time. We want to make sure that the coming school year is a safe one. Here's some very simple things parents and kids can do to make that happen.

Walking to School

Kids, always cross at designated crosswalks. Stay on sidewalks and make sure to look both ways, left-right-left, before crossing the street. Try to make eye contact with the drivers to make sure they see you. Avoid distractions such as your phone or music. If there is a crossing guard at the corner you're crossing at, please listen to them. They are there for your safety. Walk in groups if possible and never talk to or accept rides from strangers.

Parents, make sure you slow down in school zones when children are present. In case you didn't know, fines are double in a school zone. Also, please be aware of the crossing guards that are out there. There are way too many close calls with them.

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BACK TO SCHOOL SAFETY

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Biking to School: Always wear a helmet when riding your bike. In order to protect your head it has to be worn correctly. Make sure it fits your head, it's tight and you're wearing it straight across. Pedal on the right side of the road, in bike lanes if possible, and obey all traffic signs. Walk your bike across the street when you come to a crosswalk. Don't text or do anything else on your phone when you're biking.

School Bus Safety: Parents we want to clarify what you need to do when you come across a school bus with its red lights flashing and it's stop sign out. Obviously, if you're directly behind the bus and this is happening, you need to stop. The bus will flash its yellow lights first to warn you that is about to stop and load or unload its precious cargo.


Confusion arises when it comes to divided roadways. If you are on a road that is divided by grass or a concrete barrier and heading in the opposite direction of the bus you do not have to stop. However, if you are on a road where there is no physical barrier and are heading in the opposite direction you **must stop**. Even if the middle lane is just a turn lane. A good example of this is Jackson Street in Oshkosh.

Kids, you need to stay seated while on the bus and listen to the bus driver.

Personal Safety: It is always important to be aware of your surroundings. If kids have cell phones, make sure they are charged and have important contact numbers programmed in. Talk with your children about who trusted adults are and places where they can go when they feel unsafe. A family code word is also a good idea.

Social Media Safety: Families love to post "First Day of School" photos on social media with a board that lists: their child's name, their teacher's name, what grade they are in and name of their school. It's a better idea to keep names and personal information off of the board and keep the information general.

It is important that parents monitor their kid's online activity and use privacy settings on apps and devices. It's also very important to remind your children about the risks of sharing personal information online and chatting with strangers online.
