LADDER SAFETY MONTH by John Holland, PubEd Specialist

Each year in the U.S., more than 100 people die and thousands more are injured from ladderrelated falls. March is ladder safety month.

These safe ladder practices are key to preventing falls and other potential injuries.

- Read and follow all labels/markings on the ladder.
- Do not exceed the weight limit listed on the ladder (remember to include the weight of any tools you're using).
- Always inspect the ladder prior to using it.
- Never use a damaged ladder.
- Use a ladder only on a stable and level surface.
- Make sure the ladder is tall enough to do the job so you don't have to stretch or reach too much.
- Do not place a ladder on boxes, barrels, tarps or other unstable items.
- Avoid electrical hazards. Check for wires that you might come into contact with prior to placing the ladder.
- Never use a metal ladder near any wires or charged electrical equipment.

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LADDER SAFETY MONTH

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- Never use a step ladder as a straight ladder. A step ladder must be completely opened up and locked to be safe.
- Never stand on the top step of a step ladder.
- Set up a straight or extension ladder at the proper angle. The base of the ladder should be placed one quarter of the working length of the ladder. For example, if the ladder is eight feet long the bottom of the ladder should be two feet from the wall.
- If using an extension or straight ladder make sure the ladder extends at least three feet above the roof.
- Make sure the locks on an extension ladder are properly engaged.
- Do not stand on the three top rungs of a straight or extension ladder.
- Always maintain a 3-point (two hands and a foot, or two feet and a hand) contact on a ladder when climbing. Keep your body near the middle of the step and always face the ladder while climbing.
- Do not move or shift a ladder while a person or equipment is on the ladder.

While some of these dos and don'ts may seem obvious, it's important to remember that most ladderrelated injuries and fatalities are completely preventable.

It's up to you to take the proper steps.
