The holidays are just around the corner. It's time for the 24th Annual Oshkosh Fire Department Local 316 Food and Toy Drive. We will be collecting donations door to door throughout the city.

Last year was a record year, as we collected just under \$5,000 in cash and we were able to double the scholarship offered to area students. We also collected over 1,100 pounds of food and over 4,700 toys, for a monetary value of about \$23,500! These donations helped hundreds of area families and thousands of children through the Salvation Army. Thank you Oshkosh!!

We are now accepting non-perishable food items, new/unwrapped gifts, wrapping paper/tape, and cash donations. All donations will be given to the Salvation Army and distributed through their program.

IMPACTING OUR COMMUNITY

October was a successful month for the OFD. We visited 15 schools, 8 pre-schools, and talked to over 2,000 students about making a plan to escape. We also attended 7 special events including Lowe's Fire Safety Day. In addition to that, we visited 304 homes, installed 65 smoke detectors, and replaced or installed batteries at 24 homes. Roughly 1% of the homes we checked did not have any smoke detectors at all in the entire house. Only 11% of the home this year had the proper number of working detectors.

Paramedics Matthew Radig, Zach Meyer and Chad Witmer, made a successful referral to their Peer Response Team. A recovery coach spent a number of hours with the individual. The following week he attended an event with others in recovery, toured Sober Living and then went on to discuss options for recovery.

The paramedics actions embody the values of the OFD. Their respect for the individual, empathy for his situation, and teamwork helped this individual in a time of need. That is the definition of public service.

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Oshkosh Fire Department was awarded a \$27,337 grant for new lifesaving equipment from <u>Firehouse Subs</u> <u>Public Safety Foundation!</u> We are extremely grateful to the Foundation for identifying the critical need within our department and providing the resources necessary to purchase six sets of drysuits with gloves, hats and undergarments for our dive team.
